

# A message from Revd. David Jones

### People of Hope


As churches we have spent weeks on the journey to the cross with Christ and by the time of print we will have recounted his passion and now we will be trying to understand what the resurrection means for us.

Perhaps we need to get out of the fast lane and take life at a steadier pace. Some years ago, I took part in the London 100 bike ride. After what seemed like an eternity to start I found myself in a group of what felt like thousands of bicycles. The pace we were travelling at felt too fast for me, the

noise of the machinery was overwhelming. I couldn't slow down without causing an accident, I couldn't move to the side, I was stuck in my lane having to struggle to keep up, afraid of the consequences. Eventually the pack spread out and I was able to travel at my own pace.



In the Yate and Fromeside churches we have been exploring how it would have felt to have been at the first Holy Week and the first Easter. Trying to place



ourselves, our thoughts and feelings into a 2000 year old story and to gain a sense of how it is a reality for us 2000 years later. We have challenged our ideas about who the baddies and the goodies are in the story and we have realised that we too would most likely have been caught up with the crowd, too afraid to not be. We are all fallen people. So now we are seeking to find hope and joy as a result of being resurrection people as we are raised with Christ.

In a world where everything appears to be broken and all the news is bad it can be difficult to find any hope. Joy can be in short supply and when it is there, it can all too often be overshadowed by worry. Perhaps we need to spend a little time rediscovering how to find Joy, peace and happiness. That won't be found by rushing around at everybody else's pace,



that will be found by listening to God, trusting in him to safely help us to travel with him, to follow him. Jesus is there with us, through the Holy Spirit, leading and guiding us to the places of safety; we just need to be brave enough to trust! He longs to lead us in peace and hope.





We need to acknowledge the pain that Christ suffered for us and join in with the resurrection hope. Jurgen Moltmann, a 20<sup>th</sup> Century German theologian, in the shared shame of being a German soldier, caught up in a war without choice recognised this. He recognised that Christ was the only true source of hope and joy and although he had no choice he, through Christ, had hope.

The central theme of *Theology of Hope* is promise. The Christian faith is lived, Moltmann argues, in witness to the promises of a God who can and will make all things right. These promises are offered most clearly in the passion,

death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. As through death and resurrection alone, Jesus breaks the cycle of fear and despair and replaces it with joy and hope.

As Christians we share in the joy and the hope of the resurrection, as it is not just an old story, it is a reality for us, each and every day.

Once again, we come to Easter, the most extraordinary event ever recorded. We all know that the dead do not rise again, but on that original Easter Day, a group of frightened and disillusioned disciples of Jesus had a unique experience, one that turned them totally around from utter despair to rejoicing and that sent them out to share their good news as far as they could spread it.




It was not that they had not already had an inkling of the uniqueness of Jesus, who had taught them with a degree of authority that other teachers had lacked. Far from bringing the sort of message of condemnation that earlier prophets had


often preached, he had held out the very gift of his personal love to them. No prophet had even preached as he did, according to Matthew, when he said to those listening,


'Come to me, all of you who are weary and carrying heavy burdens and I will give you rest. Take my yoke on you and learn from me for I am gentle and humble in heart and you will find rest. For my yoke is easy and my burden light'

He had just previously spoken of his unique relationship with God, the Father. A week after the Resurrection, Thomas, who had somehow been absent before, was confronted with the risen Christ and made the first full









We look at the Cross and with Charles Wesley say,

'Vouchsafe us eyes of faith to see The Man transfixed on Calvary And know thee who thou art The one eternal God and true.'

We also have that most wonderful of modern hymns, 'Meekness and majesty', a hymn that St Athanasius or Charles Wesley would have been proud to write. 'Meekness and majesty, manhood and deity, in perfect harmony, the man who is God' sums it all up. The God who comes to save us acts not from the outside but from the inside, along us, as one with us. What could give us more hope and courage in a world that continues to ignore the true God as much as ever? But we know that he has in fact won the victory for all who will accept him and at great cost to that human nature which he lovingly adopted. Truly, his meekness will eventually overcome and His will ultimately will be seen as the only yoke that is light and yet can transform life from a constant burden into being the kingdom of God's love.



Let us conclude with two verses of Charles Wesley's 'How do thy mercies close me round.'

'Jesus protects: my fears be gone! What can the rock of ages move? Safe in thine arms I lay me down, Thy everlasting arms of love'.

'Me for thine own thou lov'st to take, In time and in eternity; Thou never, never wilt forsake A helpless soul that trusts in Thee.



Moses: a Hebrew adopted by an Egyptian princess. He killed an Egyptian who was beating a Hebrew slave, and hid the bady.











"There's no such thing as a free lunch", so the saying goes. It may seem that something has no cost but it's rarely the case. Hidden away if you think about it carefully there is always some downside. A good example is IT (Information Technology) and the huge amount of growth in how much we and every organisation makes use of it. More and more of us depend to a greater or lesser extent on IT: we use computers at home to

stream information from the internet (I am using one to type this) and the majority of us seem unable to be parted from our mobile phone in case we miss that important social media post (usually it's a trivial comment about nothing in particular).

But surely the environmental cost of using a computer or mobile phone is tiny, you may say. After all, it's not as if they use a lot of electricity. Doing an on-line search and then ordering what we want to have it delivered direct to our home must be better than getting in the car. That's true of course but there is a big hidden cost to IT. There are vast banks of computers in big warehouses that store all the information so we can access it at the touch of a key, and the more information we store on-line (in the "Cloud") the bigger these warehouses have to be.





And now Artificial Intelligence (AI) has appeared on the scene. It needs access to vast amounts of data and uses huge amounts of computer power to make its decisions (this tells us something about the miracle of the human brain, the fact that it takes so much computing power to come near to matching it). Just as one example, the Republic of Ireland acts as host to a large number of

so-called data factories, which between them currently use about 20% of all the electricity consumed in the country.

So next time you switch on the computer or scroll through your social media texts on the phone, think about whether you really need to send that reply or have a look at that video that's just been flagged up — "There's no such thing as a free lunch"!



Reflecting Faith: Easter Sepulchres

Over the last few months we've been looking at churchyards, and memorials. This month we are going inside the church building to find something somewhat different and only really found in older churches that have survived re-ordering and renovations: the Easter Sepulchre.

A sepulchre is essential a place of burial – a tomb – but in churches it can also be a receptacle for religious relics. Easter Sepulchres can be very grand affairs. I'm aware that many writers say that they are constructed in wood, but I have only seen stone ones. They can be plain or intricately carved. They can be low to the ground or reaching up to the roof. Each style, of course, reflects both the richness and generosity of the patron, as well as their theology.




Some have 'layers' of carvings, with the angels at the top, then the patriarchs, followed by the Fathers of the Church and so on. Others are very simple and almost plain. They are normally set into or against the northern side of the sanctuary in which stands the altar, and which is traditionally considered to be the 'holiest' place in a church building.



Their use is given in their name – on Good Friday some consecrated bread and wine and often a crucifix (rather than an 'empty' cross) is placed inside it and people take it in turns to 'stand watch' until Easter Sunday morning, when it is taken out with great ceremony and often paraded through the building. The reason is to reflect the death of Christ, His being placed in a tomb and His subsequent resurrection.

Today's ceremonies are usually less ostentatious, and whilst folk often take turns keeping watch on the Maundy Thursday, as happened this year at St James, Iron Acton, reflecting the disciples being asked to stay awake whilst Jesus went and prayed alone in the Garden of Gethsemane, less is made of the Sepulchre watch.





The items are simply removed before any Easter resurrection service takes place, either on Easter Saturday evening or early Easter Sunday morning.


### This month

### Speed cameras and Moses

I exhort therefore, that, first of all, supplications, prayers, intercessions, and giving of thanks, be made for all men; for kings, and for all that are in authority; that we may lead a quiet and peaceable life in all godliness and honesty. (1 Timothy 2:2)



It is not often you get Moses and the local police popping up in the same sermon. I was thinking about the Bible passage that has Moses' second attempt at the Ten Commandments, one of God's greatest gifts to the world.

God had given Moses the laws, but he broke them in disgust when he found the people were behaving so badly. God asked him up to the mountain again and then gave him a second set. "Keep taking the tablets"!

I was walking in my village and wondered why the traffic was driving so peacefully and slowly. When I got to the lay-by to catch a bus into town, I saw the explanation. There was a police van fitted with a speed camera. The cars were driving slowly, well within the 30mph limit. I nearly went up to the officer to thank them, and to ask if they could come every day.



It was a good illustration for the sermon I was preparing. We do not want to get caught ourselves! We expect everyone else to obey the law, but often find exceptions when we are late or have an important errand. We repeatedly make mistakes but have a loving and gracious God.

As Christians we should be good drivers, and in my case a good pedestrian and road user. We should take an interest in local affairs and find out how parish and town councils deal with these issues. We should pray for people in authority and the police-officer who spent a long Saturday morning looking at slow traffic!




