A message for December from Val Slade

AN UNEXPECTED GIFT

After all the excitement and stresses of Christmas shopping, the presents sit under the tree waiting to be opened. As givers, we worry the gift will not be suitable, even though we have carefully followed a Christmas wish list. As receivers, we are concerned that



someone has spent too much on ourselves and we cannot match their generosity. Perhaps we have forgotten to buy a gift for a relative, or left it too late to go shopping for our loved ones. These are some of the anxieties and expectations we experience when giving gifts at this festive time.

The main reason for giving gifts at this time of year is to celebrate the birth of Jesus around 2000 years ago in an innkeeper's stable in Bethlehem. Shepherds



were the first to visit Mary and Joseph and their new baby; they may not have had gifts to give him but their admiration, being poor shepherds. They were followed a while later by Wise Men from the East, who presented Jesus with gifts from treasure-chests: gold, frankincense, and myrrh. These represented symbols of the story of Jesus' life to be. Gold is a gift of richness for a king. Myrrh is precious oil, used to anoint

the dead. Frankincense is incense used in worship, fitting for a holy child (see Matthew 2.7-12).

The wise men had their treasure-chests containing physical gifts, but gifts cannot always be seen. Each of us has gifts and talents within us, and each of us can make an offering of our own. Our gifts are part of our own story in our work, our homes and our communities. Our gifts show who we are and what we bring to the world around us.



The shepherds in the fields near Bethlehem were the first people to be told of the gift of Jesus. A spectacular fanfare involving angels invited them to see this baby, with a promise that he was special. An angel told the shepherds 'I am bringing you news of great joy for all the people'. The angel went on to explain



that a Saviour had been born who would bring peace and joy to the world. They visited baby Jesus in the stable and told everyone they met what the angel had said about him, praising God before returning to their fields and their work (see Luke 2.8-20).

People have always given each other gifts; they would have helped to maintain friendships between different groups in early society. The Christmas traditions that we enjoy today were influenced by the Victorians when Christmas trees and Father Christmas also became popular.

Gift giving and receiving can be stressful but we must not forget that through the birth of Jesus we are given the greatest and most unexpected gift of all. His presence in our lives shapes how we use our inner gifts for others in our communities and families helping them to feel loved and valued. We are all invited to receive this wonderful gift.

This year, I write at a time both of grief and yet of unconquerable hope, grief because of the horrors taking place in Gaza and hope because of the coming Christmas reminder of our Christian faith that God is indeed with us, 'our God contracted to a span, incomprehensibly made man' (C. Wesley), that, as St Maximus the Confessor, the greatest of the Byzantine theologians put it, 'God so loved his creation that he willed his own embodiment within it'.





That act of love reached its fulfilment on the Cross. Again, it is Charles Wesley that puts it so well.

'Vouchsafe us eyes of faith to see The man transfixed on Calvary, To know thee, who thou art, The one eternal God and true; And let the sight, affect, subdue, And break my stubborn heart.'

Would that the Holy Spirit would melt the stubborn hearts of the extremists on both sides in the current conflict in the holy land!

So, at Christmas, we remember that God entered, through his eternally beloved Son, into the experience of all the worst that the world can do and we can sing John Wesley's favourite amongst his brother's Christmas hymns, 'All glory to God in the sky'.

At this time of year, I also have to say something about the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity (18-25 January) as that occurs before the next issue of the joint magazine. We will have a special service on the Sunday of that week, 21 Jan, at Zion Chapel. We will remember what Churches Together4Fromeside is doing, particularly in terms of providing for the needs of the least well-off in our area. We will also be praying for the wider unity of God's one holy catholic and apostolic Church across the world.

It is necessary for Christians to be united to show that it is possible for people of very different countries and cultures to be at one across all barriers and to profit from all the spiritual riches that the Holy Spirit has bestowed on the sheer multiplicity of the many Christian traditions with their varying styles of worship, fellowship and service, whilst recognising each community as one in the Christ whom we seek to follow.

In all of this Pope Francis is playing a leading role, in helping to direct us the priority of mission, in seeking through a recent Synod to listen, far more than was the custom under many earlier popes, to the faithful layfolk of his church as well as to the bishops.

In the past, Roman Catholics referred to Christ's promise, recorded in Matthew's gospel, 'you are Peter and upon this rock, I will build my church'. I rather suspect that Francis is more influenced by the command recorded in Luke's gospel when he prophesied that Peter would betray him (Luke 22;32) . Yet he left Peter with a hope that he had far from finished with him. He said, 'and when you have repented, go and strengthen your brothers.'

It is precisely what Pope Francis does in his ministry to his own Church and, indeed, for the rest of us in our separate churches. He strengthens through encouragement, example, sound teaching. Almost day by day, I become



ever more convinced that Francis is trying to do for the whole world what Wesley wanted in the 18th century to do for England, to re-kindle the joy of the gospel, accompanied by sound advice on what God intends in terms of a world of harmony, social justice and respect for the rest of creation. The loving and itinerant superintendency of Wesley in England and Asbury in the USA in their times is reflected in Francis style of global ministry today.

I am more and more convinced that there is a Petrine ministry of leadership and encouragement for the world Church, not a ministry of infallibility on theological statements, as understood in 1870 by Francis' then predecessor, Pius IX, but a real ministry of strengthening us all as we seek follow Jesus. We see that ministry being inaugurated by the Apostle Peter when he 'went here and there among all the believers' (Acts 9:32). You see it being exercised now as Pope Francis travels, despite age and ill-health. He also exercises it when he greets Christian leaders from all denominations in Rome-you can follow that from the details given on the Vatican website by the Pontifical Council for Christian Unity.

Of course, there will be many other things for us to think about in the Week of Prayer, particularly the heroism of many Christians and their churches in the wartorn state of Burkina Faso in West Africa-it is they who have prepared the material for study and prayer this January.

In one year we will complete our wedding




Then God's messenger angel came to see Mary.






Heating our homes affordably



So far this autumn we have been blessed with relatively mild weather but many people's heating systems will now be switched on for the winter. The resulting increase in household costs is a major concern for many. Sadly, the UK housing stock is not in a good state for keeping heating costs down. Much of it is old and poorly insulated and schemes to encourage and support people in making the necessary improvements are poorly developed.

For example, heat pumps are widely regarded as a good way of reducing costs, the reason being that for every unit of electricity used, up to four units of heating are produced (the best that a conventional boiler can produce is one unit of heating). The problem is that heat pump systems are expensive to install, although they save money in the long term - great in principle, but no good if you can't afford the initial



outlay. Also, they work far better in well-insulated homes. The take up of heat pumps in the UK is lagging well behind most of Europe. Last year, we were 21st out of 21 European countries in the installation of heat pumps: not surprisingly, the Scandinavian countries with their traditionally well-insulated homes did particularly well, installing 20 times as many as the UK, but even countries with warmer climates like France, Italy and Spain did 5 - 10 times better.

That doesn't mean we can't do anything to help keep heating costs down. Some cost nothing to do and others are very cheap to implement. Here is a list, with some cheaper options at the top:

- Turn down the thermostat by a degree or so
- Turn off the heating in unused rooms
- Close the blinds or curtains

- Turn off the heating when you're out
- Make sure the doors and windows don't let in draughts
- Good insulation in the roof is relatively cheap and saves a lot
- More expensive, but worthwhile if you can afford it,

is cavity wall insulation and double glazing.

We know that the old and those living with health problems are particularly vulnerable in the colder months, so keep an eye on that neighbour of yours who might be struggling. It may be that you can help directly, but at least make sure they are seeking support through relevant channels: there are lots of possibilities out there, so perhaps a good starting point is Citizen's Advice, who can advise on what might be appropriate in individual cases



I want to tell you a really encouraging good news story.



First, I'd like you to think about the answer to this question. How are you feeling? Yes, right this minute. Stop and think about it. What score are you from 1 to 10, where 1 is the worst have ever felt and 10 is the best. Then there are two more questions. 1. What is stopping you from having a higher score? 2. What is stopping you from having a lower score?

I learned to do this working as a mentor in another part of the country and its one of the best things I've learned. It's so simple and yet so effective: it's helpful to do on one's own or with another person or in a group. The young people who

do it in a group in school learn from each other as they share; acknowledging that we all have highs and lows and learning that we can support each other if we are able to share. It's something that as adults we perhaps forget to do – to check in with ourselves, to reflect and think and pray about why we feel like we do.





In Ignatian Spirituality there is something called the "Examen". St Ignatius, who founded the Society of Jesus, encourages us to reflect at the end of every day; to notice where the good bits were and to think about where God was; to think back and notice how we were feeling in different situations or conversations. We can then bring this to God in prayer and

thank him for things we didn't notice at the time, or ask, what would he have wanted me to do or say differently? What would I do differently if the same situation were to arise again is the "killer question"? By doing the Examen every day, we start to naturally respond to things in the day in the way that Jesus would want us to. Or to take it a step further to become "incarnational" ... to be Christ to those we meet every day.

Anyway, back to my story... Having moved to Bristol a few years ago, I missed JAC and the mentoring, so I approached Father Malcolm. To cut a long story short "Winterbourne JAC" was born and now we are starting our second year of providing mentors to about 10- 15 pupils a week at Winterbourne Academy. We play 1 to 10 every week and I know it's a blessing to the young people, the mentors and to me.



So, why am I telling you all this... I want to encourage you and perhaps to challenge you to try it out for yourself, or maybe to become a mentor or support the work in the school. Perhaps you would also like to read or learn about St Ignatius and "the Examen" and try that out!



There is a wisdom that comes with reflecting, a privilege that comes with really listening and a learning that comes with sharing. Expect God to work through it and you will be surprised!



Here is a picture of 1-10 at school and the lovely bunch of mentors I work with on a Thursday. Love to you all and if you are reading this from somewhere else, why don't you start a JAC mentoring scheme in your area... it really works!



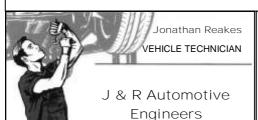
